Grants can include costs for training and infrastructure. Grants come from the Nurse Home Visitor Program Fund which is from tobacco settlement monies as well as private grants and donations. It is the intent of legislature that General Fund monies are not used for the program. Lists appropriations from 25-75-1104. Program will undergo an annual evaluation of the implementation of the program. Any entity that is not administering the program in accordance to the requirements may lose funding.
